Focus 2: Self-Care and Self Pampering 2023-2024

To feel great this year, KEHA supports the following goals:

Taking time to engage in self-care alleviates some of life's daily pressures and provides the necessary reset that allows you to get back a healthy point where you can maximize daily productivity. When you take time to spend time on yourself, you ultimately benefit everyone. But if negative experiences, behaviors, and feelings persist and/or prevent the ability of carrying out daily responsibilities, it is important that you call a health care provider and seek professional services.

In addition to supporting on-going self-care, KEHA is also exploring the temporary benefits of self-pampering. Self-pampering in this sense refers to healthy adornment practices that make us feel good in the moment. The practice of self-care and self-pampering can complement each other. When used in moderation, pampering yourself can be a form of self-care that we should not feel guilty about.

- 2. Analyze what style is best for your body shape.





Cotton Club: This guilt club meets once a month in the evening. They also have one day a month as SEW ALL DAY.

Craft Club: This club meets once a month in the evening. They do a variety of crafts. The members decide what they would like to learn or make. Usually a member of the club teaches the lesson for the chosen craft but sometimes there is an instructor. There is a small cost for supplies each month.

Crochet & Fellowship: This club is exactly what it implies. It meets once a month during the day to crochet and talk. If you are interested in learning how to crochet these ladies are your connection to learning a new skill.

Home & Heart: This club does special interests of the club members. For example, they made freezer meals as a quick grab and go for dinner. This club meets in the afternoon or evening once a month. Children are welcomed with an attendee.

Mailbox: If you would like to receive information about what is going on with Owen County Homemakers, special events, recipes, or other information of interest, you can attend what you like and you will receive a newsletter packed full of information and flyers on special events or trips the homemakers may be involved. Many of us who have very busy evenings have found this is a great way to be involved. We have members who live outside Owen County but still want to stay connected. So if you move, you can still belong as a mailbox member.



Memory Makers: This is a scrapbooking club. They meet on weekends (Friday & Saturday). Twice a year they host an event Craftin' for the Community where they rent out table space for anyone to join them and do whatever craft they would like. This is a fundraiser for them to give back to the community. If you would like to learn how to or work on a scrapbook this group is for you.

Pleasant Home: This club is a traditional homemakers club with a little twist. They are known as the "Traveling Ladies who Lunch." This club meets once a month at various restaurants for lunch where they have meeting and fellowship.

Sew & Go: This club meets once a month. Each member can decide to stay and sew or go after the demo of the project.

Sweet Owen: This club meets once a month at the Sweet Owen Store for lunch and to fellowship.

LET'S TALK TURKEY SAFETY

It's nearly Thanksgiving, and soon, delicious, juicy turkeys will take center stage at many of our holiday meals. It's so important to properly cook and prepare these birds, because you don't want anyone to get sick from a food-borne illness.

It does not matter whether you purchase a fresh or frozen turkey. But if you plan to purchase a pre-stuffed turkey, make sure it is frozen and has a seal that states it was inspected by either the U.S. Department of Agriculture or a state department of agriculture. The USDA does not recommend that you purchase a fresh, pre-stuffed turkey, because if handled incorrectly, harmful bacteria can quickly grow in the stuffing.

You can safely thaw turkeys in either the refrigerator, cold water or the microwave if the turkey is cooked immediately. You can safely cook a frozen turkey but realize that it will need to cook at least 50% longer than a thawed one.

Once you are ready to cook your turkey, set the oven temperature no lower than 325 degrees Fahrenheit and place it on a rack in a shallow roasting pan. You can add one-half cup of water to the bottom of the pan to keep the turkey moist. For optimal food safety, the USDA recommends that you separately cook the turkey and stuffing, so you can make sure both items reach 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

Measure the turkey's internal temperature with a food thermometer, even if the turkey includes a pop-up thermometer. Check the temperature in several locations including the thickest part of the breast, the innermost part of the thigh and the innermost part of the wing to make sure the temperature is 165 degrees throughout.

Remember to store leftovers within two hours after the meal. Discard any food that's been left out longer than that. To make reheating easier, divide leftovers into small portions. Eat refrigerated leftovers within three to four days. Frozen leftovers will keep for two to six months. Remember when reheating leftovers, make sure the internal temperature of the food is at least 165 degrees.

Butternut Squash and Turkey Chili

2 tablespoons olive oil 1 medium onion, chopped 4 cloves garlic, minced 1 pound ground

turkey

- 1 pound (1 small) butternut squash — peeled, seeded, and cut into 1-inch cubes
 1 cup low-sodium chicken broth
- 1 (4.5-ounce) can chopped green chilies
- 2 (14.5-ounce) cans petite diced tomatoes 1 (15-ounce) can
- no-salt-added kidney beans, drained and rinsed
- (15.5-ounce) can white hominy, drained
- 1 (8-ounce) can tomato sauce
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- 1 tablespoon ground cumin 1/2 teaspoon salt

Stovetop: Heat the olive oil in a large pot over medium heat. Stir in the onion and garlic; cook and stir for 3 minutes or until onion is translucent. Add ground turkey. Break into pieces and stir until cooked through and no longer pink. Add the butternut squash, chicken broth, green chilies, tomatoes, kidney beans, hominy, and tomato sauce. Season with chili powder, cumin, and salt. **Bring** to a simmer, **reduce** heat to medium-low, and cover. Simmer until the squash is tender, about 20 minutes.

Electric Pressure Cooker: Press sauté function. Add olive oil and onion: cook and stir for 3 minutes or until onion is translucent. Add garlic and cook for 30 more seconds. Add ground turkey. Break into pieces and stir until cooked through and no longer pink. Add the butternut squash, chicken broth, green chilies, tomatoes, kidney beans, hominy, and tomato sauce. Season with chili powder, cumin, and salt. Close the lid, and then turn venting knob to the sealing position. Pressure cook at High Pressure for 15 minutes, allow for a natural release. Open the lid carefully.

Yield: 10, 1-cup servings
