

Kentucky Winter Squash

SEASON: August through October. **NUTRITION FACTS:** Winter squash, which includes acorn squash, butternut squash, pumpkin and other varieties, is low in fat and sodium and an excellent source of vitamin A and fiber.

SELECTION: Winter squash should be heavy for its size with a hard, tough rind that is free of blemishes or soft spots.

STORAGE: Store in a cool, dry place and use within 1 month.

PREPARATION:

To Steam: Wash, peel and remove seeds. Cut squash into 2-inch cubes or quarter, leaving rind on (it will remove easily after cooking). Bring 1 inch of water to a boil in a saucepan and place squash on a rack or basket in the pan. Do not immerse it in water. Cover the pan

tightly and steam the squash 30-40 minutes or until tender.

To Microwave: Wash squash and cut it lengthwise. Place it in a baking dish and cover with plastic wrap. Microwave until tender, using these guidelines:

- Acorn squash: ½ squash,
 5-8 minutes, 1 squash,
 8½-11½ minutes.
- Butternut squash: 2 pieces, 3-4½ minutes.
- Pumpkin: 1 pound piece, 7-8 minutes.

To Bake: Wash squash and cut it lengthwise. Smaller squash can be cut in half; larger squash should be cut into portions. Remove seeds and place squash in a baking dish. Bake at 400 degrees F for 1 hour or until tender. Seeds can be toasted at 350 degrees F for 20 minutes.

CULTURAL ARTS and HERITAGE

Program Overview

The Cultural Arts and Heritage program area covers a wide and diverse subject that includes fine arts and crafts, heritage and history of both Kentucky and world cultures, literacy and reading and other areas that cover an appreciation of both the Kentucky and world culture. The following are ongoing activities of this program:

- Promote programs that broaden the understanding of our nation, state, and communities, citizenship, history, etc.
- Promote and develop cultural diversity programs.
- Revive traditional art forms and continue teaching the heritage skills such as: basketry, knitting, crocheting, embroidery, quilting, doll making, carving, painting, pottery, etc.
- Promote Extension Master Volunteer Programs to teach and preserve arts and heritage skills.
- Encourage self-expression through all forms of creative, visual, and performing arts.
- Conduct an awards program in arts and promote participation in the State Cultural Arts Exhibit.
- Promote the study of cultural heritage through literature and museums. Utilize libraries and encourage written and oral histories of families and communities. Promote genealogy programs.
- Promote reading, especially of Kentucky authors.
- Explore home-based business opportunities utilizing handmade arts and crafts.

Cultural Arts and Heritage Program of Work 2022-2025

<u>Situation:</u> Situation: Of the several entries for the word "ART" in Merriam-Webster's online dictionary, the definition, "decorative or illustrative elements in printed matter" is the inspiration for the current Three-Year Program of Work. Viewing art – such as a painting, photograph – can influence our thought processes, emotions, and behaviors. And the fundamental 'elements and principles' of art (or design) consciously and subconsciously impact our perception of what we are viewing. This Program of Work aims to introduce participants to the elements and principles of art through definitions and examples, while helping participants understand why they may or may not "like" what they see when viewing art. Participants will be encouraged to enter their own "works of art" in the Cultural Arts Exhibit.

YEAR ONE Focus (2022 - 2023): ELEMENTS and PRINCIPLES of ART

<u>Goal:</u> To provide information that will enable participants to objectively evaluate a drawing, painting, or photograph and have discussions about what makes some works of art visually pleasing or not visually pleasing

Objectives:

- Establish a foundation of understanding through a brief survey of art history
- Define the Elements of Art/Design
 - Line, shape, form, space, texture, value, color
- Define the Principles of Art/Design
 - Unity/variety, proportion, balance, contrast, emphasis, movement, rhythm, pattern
- View and critique examples of the Elements and Principles
- Discuss how the use of Elements and Principles can create something that is either visually
 pleasing or not pleasing

Activities:

- Create a scrapbook page to enter in the Cultural Arts contest that incorporates several Elements and Principles of Art
- Visit local museums to view a drawing, painting, or photograph and describe the specific Elements and Principles of Art
- Support local artists

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
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

DISTRACTED DRIVING AFFECTS ALL

We live in a world with information readily available at our fingertips 24/7. While this is a great convenience, it can be dangerous if you are behind the wheel.

According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, at any given second in the United States, an estimated 660,000 people are driving while using a cell phone or manipulating an electronic device. In 2012, over 3,000 people died and around 420,000 more were injured in automobile accidents involving a distracted driver.

Distracted driving includes any action that takes your eyes off the road. While distracted driving includes everything from cell phone use to grooming, texting is considered the most dangerous act by far. When a person is texting, it requires visual, manual and cognitive attention.

In Kentucky, it is against the law for drivers to text while behind the wheel. The state has also banned all cell phone use for novice drivers and bus drivers.

Even if you're not responding or composing a text, reading one can be just as dangerous. It takes the average person five seconds to read a text message. During that five seconds, if the person is driving 55 miles per hour, they could drive the length of a football field without paying attention to the road and traffic around them.




The best way to prevent distracted driving is not to do it and encourage your family members and friends to limit their cell phone usage while they are driving. If you are tempted, turn your cell phone off when you get in the driver's seat or put it in a compartment in your vehicle that you can't reach.

If you are a parent of a beginning driver, remind them that if a cop finds them texting or talking while behind the wheel, it could delay them getting their license or cause their license to be suspended.





Cotton Club: This guilt club meets once a month in the evening. They also have one day a month as SEW ALL DAY.

Craft Club: This club meets once a month in the evening. They do a variety of crafts. The members decide what they would like to learn or make. Usually a member of the club teaches the lesson for the chosen craft but sometimes there is an instructor. There is a small cost for supplies each month.

Crochet & Fellowship: This club is exactly what it implies. It meets once a month during the day to crochet and talk. If you are interested in learning how to crochet these ladies are your connection to learning a new skill.

Home & Heart: This club does special interests of the club members. For example, they made freezer meals as a quick grab and go for dinner. This club meets in the afternoon or evening once a month. Children are welcomed with an attendee.

Mailbox: If you would like to receive information about what is going on with Owen County Homemakers, special events, recipes, or other information of interest, you can attend what you like and you will receive a newsletter packed full of information and flyers on special events or trips the homemakers may be involved. Many of us who have very busy evenings have found this is a great way to be involved. We have members who live outside Owen County but still want to stay connected. So if you move, you can still belong as a mailbox member.



Memory Makers: This is a scrapbooking club. They meet on weekends (Friday & Saturday). Twice a year they host an event Craftin' for the Community where they rent out table space for anyone to join them and do whatever craft they would like. This is a fundraiser for them to give back to the community. If you would like to learn how to or work on a scrapbook this group is for you.

Pleasant Home: This club is a traditional homemakers club with a little twist. They are known as the "Traveling Ladies who Lunch." This club meets once a month at various restaurants for lunch where they have meeting and fellowship.

Sew & Go: This club meets once a month. Each member can decide to stay and sew or go after the demo of the project.

Sweet Owen: This club meets once a month at the Sweet Owen Store for lunch and to fellowship.

Fall Spiced Pumpkin Bread

1/2 cup all-purpose flour 11/4 cup whole-wheat 11/2 teaspoons baking powder

2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup melted margarine 1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup honey 2 cups pumpkin puree 1/3 cup olive oil 2 eggs 1/3 cup chopped walnuts

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix flours, baking powder, baking soda, pumpkin spice and salt; set aside. In a large mixing bowl, whisk together margarine, sugar, honey, pumpkin puree and olive oil. Blend in eggs. Add flour mixture. Stir until dry ingredients are moistened. Spray a 8-by-4 inch loaf pan with non-stick cooking spray. Pour batter into pan; sprinkle walnuts on top of batter. Bake for 1 hour. Remove from oven

and cover with foil. Return to oven and bake an additional 20 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool for 10 minutes and remove from pan.

Yield: 16 slices

Nutritional Analysis: 220 calories, 13 g fat, 2 g saturated fat, 30 mg cholesterol, 270 mg sodium, 26 g carbohydrate, 1 g fiber, 14 g sugars, 4 g protein.
